From the Archives Butch Huelet

A playful Butch Huelet lays down on the railroad tracks for a photo taken around 1935. The tracks are a section of the Ione Branch of the Southern Pacific Railroad extending from Galt to Ione. Sometimes called the Amador Line, SP completed the line in 1876 to service the Mother Lode gold mines and the timber industry and included passenger service. The Great Depression closed the gold mines, and the rail line stopped transporting passengers in 1932. With the streamlining of the trucking industry, the Amador Line became unprofitable, but the line is still in operation to service the SGI Plant in Ione. The photographer took this photo around the Herald/Clay Station area and, looking at the cattle guards he's laying on, suggests it is next to one of the many roads that crossed the rail line.
















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Liberty Cemetery



Galt Methodist Church

When Dr. Obed Harvey and the Central Pacific Railroad laid out the grid that would define the boundaries of the new town of Galt, they agreed to set aside land on all four corners of the grid to be donated to four churches. Between 1878 and 1885, the First Congregational Church of Galt (St. Luke's Episcopal Church), St. Christopher's Catholic Church, Galt Christian Church, and our story's topic, the Galt Methodist Church, found a home within the town's boundaries.

Before the founding of the Galt Methodist Church, members were served by a Methodist Circuit Rider who came through Galt on his route to bring the Word of God and to "marry and bury." On the weeks he was not present, the people held their own services and Sunday School. At the same time, the congregation of the Hicksville Church had gone through several pastors assigned by the Pacific Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1879, the pastor was F.M. Stanton. In 1880, he moved the Hicksville congregation to Galt to create a larger church.

Known then as the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the church's location was given as the Harvey Grove School House, located west of the Central Pacific Railroad tracks around C Street. Within a few months, movers relocated the building on the northeast corner of 6th and E Streets. It became the 3rd church to inaugurate its founding. Around 1894, the church became a casualty of a strong storm, and once again, the Galt Methodist Church was looking for a new home.

In 1895, the Isler Blacksmith Shop on the corner of 6th and C Streets burned to the ground. Rumor has it that the flames were so hot the windows in the Isler home across the street were cracked. Later that year, the trustees of the Methodist Church purchased the now-vacant lot at the corner of 6th and C Streets to build a church. By 1896, the new Galt Methodist Church was completed, built in the traditional rural style with peaked windows and a tall spire and belfry.

The Reverend John Heetebry took the reins of the church in 1924 and began a program to build a new sanctuary. Construction started in 1926 with the moving of the old church further back and facing 6th Street. The latest version of the Galt Methodist Church was dedicated in March 1927.

By the 1960s, age had taken its toll on the church, and a new sanctuary was needed. Preparations were made to replace it with a new one. In 1969, it was torn down to make way for building the present structure. In 1971, on Easter Sunday, the first services were held in the present two-story church. A memorial sanctuary was constructed and dedicated in 1979.
