
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From the Archives

Sego Drivers

Milk truck drivers pose in front of one of many milk trucks that transported milk from area dairies to the Sego Milk Plant. The Driver owned their truck and Sego Milk owned the contracts/routes. If a driver was put on another route, it usually meant you had to buy the truck that went with it. Milk was picked up twice a day, morning and evening from April thru October and then once a day in the evening November thru March. Sego Milk Company paid a percentage for each 100 lbs of milk that was brought in by each driver. Drivers could work more than one route/contract. An average route was 25-35 dairies. There were 17 different routes and they hauled all Grade B milk. Each truck could hold approx. 200 cans of milk and each can weigh 120 lbs. Sego Milk furnished the cans to the drivers. Each milk can had a number on it that was assigned to each dairy. When the milk plant stopped operation in 1961, some drivers took their truck and went to work for other milk processing companies. Louise's Walk Down Memory Lane

I remember going to the Galt Pharmacy for an ice cream cone, Single scoop on a small cone cost 5 cents. Dr. Osler would use the smallest scoop and then got just enough ice cream so it wouldn't fall to the bottom of the cone. This was in the late 30's and I had gotten a halter top from Montgomery Wards Catalogue, The halter top was low in the back with navy blue shorts cut to the knees. Dr. Osler gave me the ice cream cone and then told me to get out of town before the sheriff runs you out for the outfit you have on. I told him, "My Mother helped me pick it out and he said get out of town NOW.



Wednesday, August 1st, the Galt Area Historical Society hosted a lunch/meeting of the Sacramento Area Consortium. This group is made up of historical societies or associations within Sacramento County, Amador County, Placer County, and San Joaquin County. This group met at the McFarland Living History Ranch and was attended by approximately 30 people, plus 7 from our society.

The Dark Side of Galt History

Every town has its history they would like to forget. In the 1880s, Galt was caught up in the hysteria involving the discrimination of people of Chinese descent. According to one of Galt's early newspapers, the Galt Gazette, bigotry reared its ugly head and Galt was quilty.

James Marshall's gold discovery at Sutter's Mill caused people from around the World to come to California to seek their fortune in the gold fields, including those from China. As placer gold dried up and competition for it increased, the Chinese were driven out by white miners and moved into the cities to do low wage jobs like restaurants and laundries. After the Civil War (1861-1865), the Chinese became the scapegoats for depressed wages because they would work for less. The United States Congress passed, and President Chester A. Arthur signed the Chinese Exclusion Act (1882) which prohibited the immigration of Chinese laborers to the United States. Because of the new law, any Chinese who left the United States couldn't re-enter without first getting certification and made Chinese immigrants permanent aliens by excluding them from U.S. citizenship. What's this have to do with Galt you ask?

Without knowing it, newspapers like the Galt Gazette helped create hysteria against the Chinese living in Galt. It first told the story of the Rock Springs Massacre in Wyoming (September 1885) where white miners killed twenty-eight Chinese miners over a perceived lack of jobs. Another article told the story of Stockton passing an ordinance prohibiting Chinese laundries, and yet another report claimed Chinese armed themselves in response to a Chinese massacre

in Washington state. In February of 1886, Red Bluff citizens began boycotting Chinese businesses, and Chinese citizens left Redding through the efforts of the "Committee." The stories were similar in Galt.

According to the Gazette, an anti-Chinese held a meeting in Galt on the 13th of February 1886. The paper said the presence of people of Chinese descent was a curse. Galt's founder, Dr. Obed Harvey, spoke and stated that the Chinese were a threat to white labor and suggested boycotting them. A few days later, the owners of tenements occupied by Chinese laundrymen had given them notice to move out by March 1. Then in a reversal on previous articles, the Galt Gazette tried to calm the hysteria by deploring the violence against Chinese people and published a story stating that Chinese laundrymen of Galt had not yet retired from their business. A week later, the Galt Anti-Chinese Association met and local businessman, D.K. Stringfield, attended the Anti-Chinese Convention in Sacramento as a delegate from the Galt organization.

But then, as quickly as it started, the hysteria fizzled. Nothing more was reported in the newspaper. Either the Galt Anti-Chinese Association accomplished what they set out to do, or their cause never caught on. At the time, Galt had a small Chinese population. The only records in the historical archives state that there was a laundry on 5th Street that supplied fresh linens to hotels and restaurants. That business and the Chinese citizens disappeared years ago.




August 15th, our dear friend and Executive Board Member, Louise Loll Dowdell will turn 100.

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
